Annex 11 review recommendations for stakeholder engagement

January 2024

Background

The aim of this review is to examine the UK pest risk of produce (**fruit and vegetable**) commodities listed in Annex 11A, and high priority produce commodities identified in Annex 11B.

Goods have been determined to be high priority on the basis of:

- a). trade volumes supporting prioritisation
- b). products are specifically identifiable within commodity (CN) codes)
- c). identified as a priority by industry organisations
- d) not otherwise recently addressed as regards their regulatory status

Options are:

- To regulate the commodities for all third countries, based on risk evidence (in most cases this means retaining current Annex listings).

- To regulate the commodities for specific regions / countries, based on risk evidence, with some regions / countries being moved between Annexes
- To deregulate commodities / commodities for specific regions or countries (move to Annex 11C) where evidence suggests these do not pose a risk to the UK.

Also in scope, but not for the initial timelines, are to examine the cut flower / plant parts commodities listed in Annex 11A – these have currently been classified as medium risk, but pending risk assessment. A few commodities in these categories, which were more easily definable from commodity codes, have been assessed.

Root and tubercle vegetables and other vegetables where the principal risk is their association with soil (eg carrots, parsnips, leeks) have not been assessed. Root and tubercle vegetables are currently regulated in Annex 11A due to association with soil and all countries will retain the status quo (i.e. all countries currently subject to the requirements of this Annex).
