





Stakeholder Engagement on Seed Certification Fees in England and Wales

An information paper and questionnaire on the introduction of new fees for OECD certification services and ISTA sampling carried out by APHA

August 2025

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Background

Seed Certification Process

Seed certification is a statutory quality assurance process which ensures that seeds are sufficiently pure, healthy, viable, and correctly labelled. Marketed seed must be:

- certified in line with legislative requirements¹,
- produced through a defined generation system, meeting specified quality standards,
- and correctly packaged, labelled and sealed.

In England and Wales, this service is administered by APHA on behalf of Defra and the Welsh Ministers. (N.B. Scottish Government and DAERA are responsible for delivering seed certification services and setting associated fees in Scotland and Northern Ireland respectively).

OECD Certification

The <u>OECD Schemes for the Varietal Certification of Seed</u> promote the use of certified agriculture seed that is of consistently high quality. These seeds are produced – and officially controlled – according to a set of harmonised procedures put in place in participating countries. The aim is to stimulate the production and use of high-quality seeds.

There are eight Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) schemes for the varietal certification or the control of seed moving in international trade:

- Grasses and legumes
- Crucifers and other oil or fibre species
- Cereals
- Maize
- Sorghum
- Sugar beet and fodder beet
- Subterranean clover and similar species
- Vegetables

In England and Wales fees are not currently charged for OECD certification.

ISTA Testing and Sampling

Seed tests provide farmers, seed traders and regulators with information on the quality of seed before it is sown. The primary purpose of the International Seed Testing Association (ISTA) is to develop and issue standard procedures for seed sampling and testing and to promote a uniform application of these procedures for the evaluation of seed intended for the market.

ISTA international certificates can only be issued by ISTA accredited laboratories. They guarantee:

the identity of the seed lot with a single reference

- the traceability of the analysis
- the competence of the laboratory that did the analysis
- the use of validated methods and standard units and the use of standard reporting languages

In England and Wales, fees are not currently charged for ISTA sampling carried out by APHA.

Exporting seed from Great Britain to third countries, or moving seed from Great Britain to Northern Ireland

For seed to be exported from Great Britain to third countries or moved from GB to Northern Ireland, it needs to comply with the requirements of the country that the seed is being exported/moved to.

For exports to the EU, the requirements are:

- A variety that is on the EU Common Catalogue
- Certified under OECD rules if there is a relevant OECD scheme (OECD labels must contain the statement 'EU rules and standards')
- Have an ISTA Orange International Certificate (OIC)

For movements to Northern Ireland, the requirements are:

- A variety that is on the NI Variety List or EU Common Catalogue
- Certified under OECD rules if there is a relevant OECD scheme (OECD labels must contain the statement 'EU rules and standards')
- Have an ISTA Orange International Certificate (OIC)

For exports to other third countries which are a member of the OECD seed schemes, the requirements are:

- A variety that is on the OECD List
- Certified under OECD rules if there is a relevant OECD scheme
- Have an ISTA OIC

For non-OECD members, exports would be per the country's own requirements, however it is rare that movements are made from GB to non-OECD members.

The OECD labelling and certificate, together with the ISTA OIC, show that seed meets standards for varietal identity, varietal purity and seed quality.

Overview of Seed Certification Fees

The cost of testing seed for the issuing of OICs for seed lots intended for movement to Northern Ireland, carried out by NIAB's Official Seed Testing Station (OSTS), is charged directly to the applicant. Costs associated with ISTA sampling and OECD certification are not currently recovered from users of these services and are subsidised by APHA at a cost to the taxpayer, therefore requiring government intervention to achieve full cost recovery in line with HMT guidance.

It is UK Government policy to charge for many publicly provided goods and services. The standard approach is to set fees to recover the full costs of service delivery and to review these fees on a regular basis (either annually or bi-annually as required) to relieve the general taxpayer of costs, so that they are properly borne by users who benefit from a service. This allows for a more equitable distribution of public resources and enables lower public expenditure and borrowing.

Power to charge fees in relation to OECD and ISTA

The marketing of seeds of the main agricultural and vegetable species in England is regulated by the <u>Seed Marketing Regulations 2011</u> (England) and in Wales by the <u>Seed Marketing (Wales) Regulations 2012</u>, where it is provided at <u>Regulation 29</u> – "The Secretary of State may charge a reasonable fee for anything done under these Regulations" and "The Welsh Ministers may charge a reasonable fee for anything done under these Regulations" respectively.

Proposals

Introduce new fees for OECD Certification

The proposal is to introduce new fees for OECD certification.

The fees for OECD certification will apply to both primary certification under the OECD scheme and for re-certification of seed already certified under the England and Wales service.

The introduction of these fees in England and Wales will enable APHA to recover the costs of OECD certification to operate in line with the principle of full cost recovery (Managing Public Money, HM Treasury (HMT), June 2025). The objective of introducing a new fee for OECD certification is more efficient use of public resources by transferring the full cost of service provision from the general taxpayer to the direct beneficiaries of the service.

The proposed new fees² are:

Service	Proposed New Fee (£)
Issuing of an OECD Certificate (per certified seed lot)	146.28
Imported seed to be entered into UK certification system	61.05
Multiplication abroad agreement* (per crop)	213.30

^{*} There are three types of multiplication abroad.

- 1. Seed from the UK is sent to another country for multiplication (the UK is the requestor).
- 2. Seed is sent to the UK for multiplication (the UK is the producer).
- 3. The variety to be multiplied is on either the GB or NI list, but neither the requestor nor the producing country are the UK.

Introduce new fees for ISTA sampling

The proposal is to introduce new fees for ISTA sampling³ carried out by APHA in England and Wales.

The proposed fees do not apply to ISTA sampling carried out by Licenced Seed Samplers (LSSs)⁴. The proposed fees will be paid on top of the current existing fees for seed testing and issuing the ISTA OIC, recovered directly by NIAB.

The introduction of these fees will enable APHA to recover the costs of ISTA sampling to operate in line with the principle of full cost recovery (Managing Public Money, HM Treasury (HMT), June 2025). The objective of introducing a new fee for ISTA sampling is more efficient use of public resources by transferring the full cost of service provision from the general taxpayer to the direct beneficiaries of the service.

The proposed new fees⁵ are:

Service	Proposed New Fee (£)
Minimum charge for each visit to take an OIC sample/s (up to 30 minutes)	127.60 for the first 30 minutes
Additional charge for every 15 minutes of an inspector's time spent on:	63.80 per each additional 15 minutes
carrying out the inspection on siteassociated on site activities	•

Payment will be required in full for every 15 minutes, even if it takes less time. For example, if it takes 42 minutes to complete the visit, payment will be required for 45 minutes.

The time it takes for the inspector to travel to and from the site to conduct the inspection is already included in the fees.

The proposed ISTA fees are based on the export hourly charge derived from the last Plant Health fees refresh. This is a time-based charge for inspectors to carry out services during on-site visits. The charge applies per visit, rather than per service meaning that if more than one service is carried out e.g., taking an OIC sample AND an export inspection during the same visit, only one fee will be applicable.

³ ISTA sampling refers to the official sampling and overseeing of sealing of seed carried out by APHA in accordance with the Seed Marketing Regulations 2011 (in England) and the Seed Marketing (Wales) Regulations 2012 (in Wales) using the techniques laid down in the ISTA rules for issuing an ISTA certificate.

⁴ LSS means a person who has been granted a license under the Seed Marketing Regulations 2011 (in England) and the Seed Marketing (Wales) Regulations 2012 (in Wales) to carry out functions in relation to seed sampling. When taking a sample for certification the LSS is acting on behalf of the Certifying Authority.
