## Regulating the seed of certain Solanum species

I am writing to notify you of the proposed changes to regulate the seed of certain *Solanum* spp. imported from any third country. These changes would take effect by November 2024.

## **Background**

The phytosanitary import regime in Great Britain is not static and is kept under continuous review to ensure that it continues to address any biosecurity risk posed to the UK, and that it meets our WTO obligations by being risk-based.

Solanum sisymbriifolium, also known as sticky nightshade, is currently being used as a trap crop in potato rotations. Sticky nightshade stimulates the hatching of potato cyst nematodes (PCN), such as *Globodera rostochiensis* and *G. pallida*, though it is resistant to infestation, preventing reproduction of the hatched nematodes. The extent of sticky nightshade use in the UK has been estimated to be around 100-300 hectares.

## Issue

The seed of sticky nightshade has recently been found to harbour the regulated non-quarantine pest, potato spindle tuber viroid (PSTVd). There is a significant risk that this pest could then transfer to potatoes. We therefore plan to regulate the seed of sticky nightshade as a host of PSTVd, requiring official testing to certify freedom from PSTVd.

Other *Solanum* species may be used as a trap crop in potato plantations and may also be a risk. We plan to require a Phytosanitary Certificate for all seeds of *Solanum* species (unless already required) to address this risk. Checks on the impacted species would increase from 1% to 5%.
