Pest Alert: Red-necked longhorn beetle (Aromia bungii)

- Aromia bungii is a wood boring longhorn beetle, that is one of the most destructive pests of *Prunus* fruit trees (cherry, plum, apricot and peach). Ornamental *Prunus* species can also be attacked.
- Native to south-eastern Asia, *Aromia bungii* was **first found in Europe in 2008**, with outbreaks in **Italy** and **Germany**. The outbreak near Naples is of particular concern because the outbreak area is quite large (over 20 km wide) and getting larger as the pest continues to spread.
- Importers and growers of *Prunus* should be aware, and take care when sourcing plant material from Europe. Importers of products packaged in wood should also be aware as the beetle larvae can be transported with wood.
