Pest Alert: Thaumatotibia leucotreta

- False codling moth, *Thaumatotibia leucotreta*, is a pest of many crops including **peppers**, roses and oranges. It feeds inside the fruit, and often the feeding damage leads to further fungal and bacterial rot.
- It is native to sub-Saharan Africa, and is also found in Israel.
- The UK has had hundreds of findings of this pest in the past few years on chilli pepper from various countries in Africa. It has also recently been found inside grapes.
- False codling moth **poses** a **risk to the UK if it were to be introduced to a glasshouse**: there have been two outbreaks (now eradicated) of this pest in the Netherlands under protected cultivation (2009).
