



	This action is for the EU exporter
1.1 EU exporter checks GB requirements	<ul> <li>EU exporters will need to check:</li> <li>The requirement for a phyto sanitary certificate (PC)</li> <li>From April onwards ALL regulated plant and plant material will need a PC</li> <li>Is my plant or plant material regulated? This same list will then require physical inspections at a BCP from July 2021.</li> <li>Physical checks are being introduced later than the notification requirements to give operators time to transition and get used to the new regime.</li> </ul>
2.0 Exporter to register as a professional operator on EUCA system	<ul> <li>Anyone who exports to GB will need to be registered with the EU CA. They need to contact their EU CA. Contact points are available for Member States (MSs) on the <u>https://www.ippc.int/en/countries/all/list-countries/</u></li> </ul>
2.1 From July Importer/exporter checks that the transport route and BCP is appropriate for the consignment	<ul> <li>This action is for the exporter/importer</li> <li>From July 2021 all risk based physical checks will be conducted on all regulated plant and plant products that need to be notified on the new plant health IT service plus a percentage of non-notifiable plant products that CHIEFS/CDS selects</li> <li>These checks will then all be carried out at BCPs.</li> </ul>
	This step is for the importer
2.2 From April - Is the importer registered on the agreed import IT system?	<ul> <li>The importer and importer's agent, needs to register on the relevant import notification system for plant health purposes prior to importing to ensure no delays to the consignment.</li> <li>Even if your plant/plant product generally does not require prenotification there is a possibility that CHIEF/CDS will select them for checking and then require pre-notification.</li> <li>This additional requirement for pre-notification applies to a small sample of non-notifiable plants plus a small sample of GMS and a small sample of SMS fruit and vegetables (whether already notified or not) so it is prudent to have registered on the new plant health IT service as soon as practicable in order to reduce delays.</li> <li>Please refer to the Plant Health (Phytosanitary Conditions) (Amendment) (EU Exit) Regulations 2020 legislation</li> </ul>

<u>e/10</u> Schedule 10 Part B sets out which plants and product will be
subject to the notification risk based regime from July 2021, i.e. a
profiling mechanism will be introduced in CHIEF/CDS and will select a
small sample of all plant commodities, alerting the importer that a
plant notification is required and official controls at point of entry
may also be required.
• If your plants or plant product lands/arrives in England or Wales you
will need to use the new plant health IT service to pre-notify
• Please note, if it lands in Scotland the Scottish Gov do not use a plant
health IT service so exporters would need to follow the relevant
registration processes for Scottish Government.

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# MARKETING STANDARDS STEPS ADDED FOR FRUIT AND VEGETABLE PLANT PRODUCTS (not cut flowers)

# 1 Jan – 30 Jun 2021

- Current third country processes remain the same for those countries, including those which have retained AIS status as per annex IV of EC reg 543/2011.
- For produce of EU origin, we will not be inspecting Specific Marketing Standards (SMS) or General Marketing Standards (GMS) fruit and veg during this time.
- An EU issued certificate of conformity will not be required for release into free circulation into GB.

### 1 July 2021 – 1 Jan 2023

- Using the notification that the importer makes on CHIEFS/CDS for customs, a small sample of imports from the EU (SMS and GMS) will be selected for checks to ensure they are complying with GB marketing standards.
- CHIEF/CDS will randomly select this small sample for GB certificate of conformity with an error report on the Customs entry – this means you need to have a marketing standards check. Traders will then apply through the new plant health IT service, if they have not already done so and these will be physically inspected at the border before release into free circulation can occur as edible fruit and vegetables.
- An EU issued certificate of conformity will not be required for release into free circulation into GB.

#### Between 1 Jan 2021 and 31 Dec 2022

• EU countries will be encouraged to apply to the UK to become listed as an approved inspection service (AIS) as under Art 15 of EU reg 543/2011


# From Jan 23 onwards

- All SMS plant products and green bananas imported from the EU will need to be pre-notified for HMI purposes on the new plant health IT service
- All SMS will need to be accompanied by a certificate of conformity from an EU country that has AIS status or apply for one at the GB border.
- If the country does not have AIS status then the SMS plant product will be subject to a risk assessment within the new plant health IT service This assessment will either result in the issue of a GB certificate of conformity or flag to the HMI/Scottish government that a conformity check is needed at the border this is akin to existing 3<sup>rd</sup> country process.
- For GMS products, a small sample of imports from the EU will be selected for checks to ensure they are complying with GB marketing standards.
- SMS commodities apples, pears, grapes, kiwis, citrus, peaches, nectarines, strawberries, lettuce, tomatoes, sweet peppers
- GMS commodities covers most other fruit and vegetables

7.0 From April importer/agent submits notification for some plants for plant health purposes to GB CA	<ul> <li>These actions are for the exporter/importer</li> <li>From April most, but not all, regulated plants will require pre-notification. Further information can be found in the importers guide (https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/plant-species-by-import-category/import-requirements-for-plants-plant-produce-and-products).</li> <li>There will be a new plant heath IT service to facilitate the pre-notification of the imports of plants and plant products.</li> <li>We will be providing comprehensive training and support for this new service.</li> <li>From 01 January Scotland will use PEACH for EU imports. ROW imports will continue as current.</li> <li>Consignments will have to be exported before the end of the validity period of a PC.</li> <li>The GB CA in England and Wales is APHA and Scottish Government in Scotland.</li> </ul>
8.0 Exporter sends goods with the PC and other documents	<ul> <li>These actions are for the exporter</li> <li>From April goods need to be accompanied by PC and normally the invoice, and commercial documents.</li> <li>Quite often agents will provide other documents to APHA and Scottish Government to corroborate the info on a PC. This may include the Bill of Lading or an Airway Bill. These are commercial documents that contain references that primarily provide information to port operators.</li> </ul>
9.0 From January – you need to complete an export customs declaration on EU MS Customs platform	<ul> <li>These actions are for the exporter</li> <li>You also need to submit a Safety and Security declaration and an export customs declaration through the MS platform</li> <li>This is required at the point of export from the MS and before the point of import in GB</li> </ul>
10.0 From July – you need to submit imports declaration on CHIEF/CDS	These actions are for the importer

<ul> <li>Import declarations for all plants/plant products are deferred for the first 6 months as plant health goods are not on the controlled list until July.</li> <li>This means that between January and July you can choose to either make a simplified (frontier) customs declaration and provide a supplementary declaration within 6 months of import OR use existing customs process to complete a full imports declaration at the point of entry to GB.</li> <li>From July 2021, a S&amp;S declaration will also be required in addition to the import customs declaration submitted through CHIEF/CDS. This is not a delayed requirement, nothing is required before July so there are no retrospective S&amp;S declarations needed to cover Jan – July</li> </ul>





	If they cannot – the GB CA will discuss potential compliance options with the importer
	Actions to be taken by the GB Competent Authority
16.0 From July – goods may be selected for physical and identity checks	<ul> <li>Physical and identity checks consist of visual inspections of goods to ensure they are pest free and to verify the content and labelling of a consignment. These checks also confirm the amounts of the goods, to ensure the correct quantity of the consignment.</li> <li>From July all regulated plants that are pre-notified for plant health purposes will be subject to risk based physical and identity checks.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>identity checks.</li> <li>From July a small sample of plant/plant products that are not notified for plant health will be selected by CHIEFS/CDS and will be subject to physical checks and pre-notification on the new plant health IT service</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>In addition from July –the small sample of SMS and GMS plant selected by CHIEFS/CDS will also be subject to physical checks by HMI/Scottish government and pre-notification</li> </ul>
17.0 Do goods require laboratory testing?	<ul> <li>Actions to be taken by the GB Competent Authority</li> <li>At point of destination GB CA may carry out laboratory testing to understand whether a pest or disease is present. As per specific sampling processes. The goods must be held on site without tampering until the results have been received.</li> </ul>
	• If No go to next step. If Yes go to step 19.
18.0 Do goods pass physical and identity checks?	<ul> <li>Actions to be taken by the GB Competent Authority</li> <li>If No go to step 19 If Yes go to step 23</li> </ul>
19.0 If lab tested goods are sampled and detained until results received.	<ul> <li>Actions to be taken by the GB Competent Authority</li> <li>GB CA record sample data on their system and a notice holding the goods is served on the person in control of the goods.</li> </ul>

20.0 Do goods pass laboratory testing?	10

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	<ul> <li>If No go to step 21 If Yes got to step 23</li> </ul>
21.0	Actions to be taken by the GB Competent Authority
Non-compliant consignment updated on GB CA system	• A statutory notice must be issued by the inspectorate to the person in control of the goods to notify them of the outcome and the action required in response to the non-compliance.
	This actions to be done by GB Border
22.0 Goods seized, re-exported or destroyed	<ul> <li>Occasionally goods may be processed to remove the risk.</li> <li>If this is the case then this is the end of the process</li> </ul>
23.0 GB CA updates system with outcome of inspection	This action is for the GB Competent Authority
24.0 GB system receives update and a decision is required if goods can be released	<ul> <li>This actions is to be done by GB Border</li> <li>If yes go to step 25. If no go to step 26.</li> </ul>
	This action is to be done by the GB Border
25.0 Goods are released to importer.	<ul> <li>From January – July there is no holding for customs reasons</li> <li>From July (when the goods are classified as controlled) an automated customs release of goods will be arranged – in Scotland this will be via a paper quarantine release certificate being issued until they are linked to the new plant health IT service</li> </ul>
	This actions is to be done by GB Border
26.0 Goods may be held for other reasons, such as Marketing Standards fraud/smuggling/not paying a tariff	11

	<ul> <li>This can include HMI, Scottish Government and other government agencies such as UKBF</li> <li>This is relevant for goods that have had physical checks.</li> <li>If this is the case, the process ends here</li> </ul>
27.0 Goods arrive with customer	This action is for the importer/exporter
